3RD SUNDAY OF LENT YEAR C - 23rd MARCH 2025

People are questioning Jesus today, trying to work out why tragedies befall some people and not others, where those who were killed by Pilate or those killed in the tragic collapse of a tower in Siloam great sinners? Had they done something terrible to deserve what happened to them? Those questioning Jesus are trying to reassure themselves that the same thing couldn't happen to them. Maybe questions some still ask today.

Jesus's answer is a flat no, but he doesn't stop there, "but unless you repent you will all perish as they did." Jesus wants those listening to him to understand, there is more than just the here and now. You could die tomorrow, so what are you doing now? What are you doing with your life? The famous acronym YOLO that is used so often today, "You Only Live Once", can be a dangerous way to live, I can do whatever now, cause it won't matter later, but Christ came so that we might have salvation, life eternal, but are we living for God, or for ourselves? Christ gives an example for them of the fig tree in the vineyard, the owner wants to remove the fig tree as it continued to bear no fruit, but the gardener asks for one more year, to allow him to work on it, to give it a chance to bear fruit. Maybe the questions those listening to Jesus that day should of asked were Do we bear fruit? If I died like those in the tower would I be able to stand before God, and declare myself His good and faithful servant?

An example that comes to mind is that of Blessed Carlo Acutis who will be canonized on Sunday 27th April 2025. Blessed Carlo Acutis who died at the age of fifteen from leukemia was friendly, kind and outgoing, known to befriend any he met and with a love for all things technology, Carlo was inspired by the words of Steve Jobs, former CEO of Apple "Your time is limited, so don't waste it living the life of someone else." For Blessed Carlo, the highest good in life was God, and sort to use the time he had and the gifts that God had given him to that Good, he used his skills to update and develop the websites for his Parish and School, as well as sharing his great love for Christ in the Eucharist, building and evangelising through his website The Eucharistic Miracles of the World.

Blessed Carlo, even though only 15 at the time faced his death with great courage, his last words to his mother "Mom, don't be afraid. Since Jesus became a man, death has become the passage towards life, and we don't need to flee it. Let us prepare ourselves to experience something extraordinary in the eternal life." This young saint understood the words of today's Gospel, lived and experienced them. As we are in the middle of lent, we have an opportunity to look toward the example of Blessed Carlo and following in his footsteps be prepared to stand before God and declare ourselves His good and faithful

The Annunciation of the Lord -25th March 2025

The Solemnity of the Annunciation is celebrated nine months before the Nativity of the Lord, a feast that came about earlier historically. The Annunciation recalls the day when the Archangel Gabriel appeared to Mary and revealed God's will that she become the Mother of the Son of God and she accepted. At that moment, the "Word became Flesh and dwelt among us" (John 1:14).



READINGS OF THE DAY – 3RD SUNDAY OF LENT YEAR C

Exodus 3:1-8. 13-15 First Reading

Moses was looking after the flock of Jethro, his father-in-law, priest of Midian. He led his flock to the far side of the wilderness and came to Horeb, the mountain of God. There the angel of the Lord appeared to him in the shape of a flame of fire, coming from the middle of a bush. Moses looked; there was the bush blazing but it was not being burnt warnings for us, not to have the wicked lusts for forbidden up. 'I must go and look at this strange sight,' Moses said, 'and see why the bush is not burnt.' Now the Lord saw him go forward to look, and God called to him from the middle of happened to them as a warning and it was written down to the bush. 'Moses, Moses!' he said. 'Here I am' he answered. 'Come no nearer' he said. 'Take off your shoes, for the place on which you stand is holy ground. I am the God of your father,' he said 'the God of Abraham, the God of Isaac and the God of Jacob.' At this Moses covered his face, afraid to look at God. And the Lord said, 'I have seen the miserable state of my people in Egypt. I have heard their appeal to be free of their slave-drivers. Yes, I am well aware of their sufferings. I mean to deliver them out of the hands of the Egyptians and bring them up out of that land to a land rich and broad, a land where milk and honey flow.'

Then Moses said to God, 'I am to go, then, to the sons of Israel and say to them, "The God of your fathers has sent me to you." But if they ask me what his name is, what am I to tell them?' And God said to Moses, 'I Am who I Am. This' he added 'is what you must say to the sons of Israel: "The Lord, the God of your fathers, the God of Abraham, the God of Isaac, and the God of Jacob, has sent me to you." This is my name for all time; by this name I shall be invoked for all generations to come.'

Second Reading <u>1 Corinthians 10:1-6, 10-12</u> I want to remind you how our fathers were all guided by a cloud above them and how they all passed through the sea.

They were all baptised into Moses in this cloud and in this sea; all ate the same spiritual food and all drank the same spiritual drink, since they all drank from the spiritual rock that followed them as they went, and that rock was Christ. In spite of this, most of them failed to please God and their corpses littered the desert. These things all happened as things that they had. You must never complain: some of them did, and they were killed by the Destroyer. All this be a lesson for us who are living at the end of the age. The man who thinks he is safe must be careful that he does not fall.

Some people arrived and told Jesus about the Galileans whose blood Pilate had mingled with that of their sacrifices. At this he said to them, 'Do you suppose these Galileans who suffered like that were greater sinners than any other Galileans? They were not, I tell you. No; but unless you repent you will all perish as they did. Or those eighteen on whom the tower at Siloam fell and killed them? Do you suppose that they were more guilty than all the other people living in Jerusalem? They were not, I tell you. No; but unless you repent you will all perish as they did.' He told this parable: 'A man had a fig tree planted in his vineyard, and he came looking for fruit on it but found none. He said to the man who looked after the vineyard, "Look here, for three years now I have been coming to look for fruit on this fig tree and finding none. Cut it down: why should it be taking up the ground?" "Sir," the man replied "leave it one more year and give me time to dig round it and manure it: it may bear fruit next year; if not, then you can cut it down."'
