


as RCIA Support and in preaching in the Cathedral Parish. We wish him God's abundant blessings in his new assignment.

# Cathedral Heritage Treasures

#### Statue of St Paul



Situated in the Cathedral nave's eastern side statuary niche, St Paul is rendered holding a sword as his attribute, and a scroll. St Paul is frequently depicted with a sword for two primary reasons. The first reason is because St Paul is well known for his epistle to the Ephesians, where he famously describes the "armor of God." St Paul uses a similar analogy with the Hebrews "For the word of God is living and active, sharper than any two-edged sword" (Hebrews 4:12). For this reason, St Paul is frequently also holding a book or scroll - the "word of God," representing his epistles in the New Testament. The second reason relates to what is a long-standing tradition of depicting martyr saints with instruments of their death. In this case the sword is a reminder that Paul was beheaded in Rome in 67 AD.

#### Statue of St Peter



Situated in the Cathedral nave western side statuary niche, St Peter is rendered holding his traditional attribute - the keys to heaven and hell, which represent the powers of absolution and excommunication. Peter was one of the 12 Apostles of Jesus. Roman Catholic traditions holds that Jesus established St Peter as the first pope (Matthew 16:18). Jesus also gave him "keys of the kingdom of heaven" (Matthew 16:19), which is why he is often depicted at the gates of heaven in art and popular culture. One key represents the power to bind and loose in heaven, spiritual authority: while the second represents the power to bind and loose on earth, temporal authority.

### REFLECTION 12H SUNDAY in ORDINARY TIME

In the gospel, Jesus encourages us: "Do not be afraid, for everything that is now covered will be uncovered." This includes the plans of the evil ones who constantly threaten to persecute and destroy the just. It suffices to note that Christ knows that fear and the threat of death can paralyse one. As the Lord of the living and the dead, He knows that physical death is not the end. Instead, it is a transition to eternity. Hence, he further exhorts us: "Do not be afraid of those who can kill the body but cannot kill the soul. Rather, fear him who can destroy both body and soul in hell fire."

In these comforting and assuring words of Christ, rest our hope and future as Christians. "Every hair on your head has been counted. So, there is no need to be afraid!" They indicate that the Lord is on our side. He is ready and capable of delivering us from sin's consequences and harmful effects and all the threats we face daily.

**Finally,** all we need to do to merit the protection Christ promised us today is to be on his side by trusting him. This calls for being just and innocent in our ways and actions. It means being true Christians. Of course, it also means submitting entirely to Christ.


