2ND SUNDAY OF LENT YEAR C - 16th MARCH 2025

A Call to Listen and Follow

As we journey through the Second Sunday of Lent in Year C, the Gospel (Luke 9:28 -36) presents the Transfiguration, where Jesus reveals His divine glory to Peter, James, and John, This revelation strengthens their faith, preparing them for the trials ahead.

The first reading (Genesis 15:5-12, 17-18) recounts God's covenant with Abraham. God promises Abraham descendants as numerous as the stars, even though he and his wife, Sarah, are old and childless. Abraham's faith is tested, but he trusts in God's word. This moment of trust reminds us that faith requires believing in God's promises, even when circumstances seem impossible.

Like Abraham, we are called to trust in God's plan, even when life feels uncertain. Lent is a time to strengthen our faith, reflecting on how we respond to God's call and His promises in our lives.

In the second reading (Philippians 3:17—4:1), St. Paul reminds us that our true citizenship is in heaven. He contrasts those who focus only on earthly things with those who set their hearts on Christ. Paul urges us to stand firm in faith, resisting distractions that pull us away from our heavenly goal.

Lent challenges us to evaluate where our hearts are focused. Are we living as citizens of heaven, or are we too attached to the things of this world? Through prayer, fasting, and almsgiving, we realign ourselves with God's will and deepen our longing for eternal life with Him.

The Gospel of Luke describes Jesus' Transfiguration on the mountain, where His face shines like the sun, and His clothes become dazzlingly white. Moses and Elijah appear, representing the Law and the Prophets, confirming that Jesus is the fulfillment of God's plan. The Father's voice is heard, saying, "This is my chosen Son; listen to Him."

The Transfiguration is not just about Jesus' glory but also about the disciples' transformation. Peter, James, and John are given a glimpse of Jesus's divine nature to strengthen their faith before His Passion. Similarly, God gives us moments of grace—through prayer, sacraments, and Scripture—to strengthen us for the challenges we face.

The Father's command, "Listen to Him," is at the heart of this Sunday's message. In a world filled with noise and distractions, we must intentionally listen to Jesus. Lent provides an opportunity to quiet our hearts, seek His voice in Scripture, and deepen our relationship with Him.

As we continue our Lenten journey, let us embrace faith like Abraham, set our hearts on heaven like Paul, and open ourselves to transformation through Christ's glory. May this season renew our commitment to listen to Jesus and follow Him more closely.



ST PATRICK - 17TH MARCH

Patrick arrived in Slane, Ireland on March 25, 433. He met the chieftan of one of the druid tribes, who tried to kill him. After an intervention from God, Patrick was able to convert the chieftain and preach the Gospel throughout Ireland. He converted many people and he began building churches across the country. Patrick preached and converted all of Ireland for 40 years. He worked many miracles and wrote of his love for



God in Confessions. After years of living in poverty, traveling and enduring much

suffering he died March 17, 461.

ST JOSEPH - 19TH MARCH

To capture the devotion to Saint Joseph within the Catholic liturgy, in 1870, Pope Pius IX declared Saint Joseph the patron of the universal Church. In 1955, Pope Pius XII added the feast of Saint Joseph the Worker. This silent saint, who was given the noble task of caring and watching



over the Virgin Mary and Jesus, now cares for and watches over the Church and models for all the dignity of human work.



READINGS OF THE DAY – 2ND SUNDAY OF LENT YEAR C

First Reading Genesis 15:5-12. 17-18

Taking Abram outside the Lord said, 'Look up to heaven and count the stars if you can. Such will be your descendants' he told him. Abram put his faith in the Lord, who counted this as making him justified.

'I am the Lord' he said to him 'who brought you out of Ur of the Chaldaeans to make you heir to this land.' 'My Lord, the Lord' Abram replied, 'how am I to know that I shall inherit it?' He said to him, 'Get me a three-year-old heifer, a three-year-old goat, a three-year-old ram, a turtledove and a young pigeon.' He brought him all these, cut them in half and put half on one side and half facing it on the other; but the birds he did not cut in half. Birds of prey came down on the carcasses but Abram drove them off.

Now as the sun was setting Abram fell into a deep sleep, and terror seized him. When the sun had set and darkness had fallen, there appeared a smoking furnace and a firebrand that went between the halves. That day the Lord made a Covenant with Abram in these terms:

'To your descendants I give this land, from the wadi of Egypt to the Great River.'

Second Reading Philippians 3:17 – 4:1

My brothers, be united in following my rule of life. Take as your models everybody who is already doing this and study them as you used to study us. I have told you often, and I repeat it today with tears, there are many who are behaving as the enemies of the cross of Christ. They are destined to be lost. They make foods into their god and they are proudest of something they ought to think shameful; the things they think important are earthly things. For us, our homeland is in heaven, and from heaven comes the saviour we are waiting for, the Lord Jesus Christ, and he will transfigure these wretched bodies of ours into copies of his glorious body.

He will do that by the same power with which he can subdue the whole universe.

So then, my brothers and dear friends, do not give way but remain faithful in the Lord. I miss you very much, dear friends; you are my joy and my crown.


From the shining cloud the Father's voice is heard: this is my beloved Son, hear him.

Gospel Luke 9:28-36

Jesus took with him Peter and John and James and went up the mountain to pray. As he prayed, the aspect of his face was changed and his clothing became brilliant as lightning. Suddenly there were two men there talking to him; they were Moses and Elijah appearing in glory, and they were speaking of his passing which he was to accomplish in Jerusalem. Peter and his companions were heavy with sleep, but they kept awake and saw his glory and the two men standing with him. As these were leaving him, Peter said to Jesus, 'Master, it is wonderful for us to be here; so let us make three tents, one for you, one for Moses and one for Elijah.' — He did not know what he was saying. As he

spoke, a cloud came and covered them with shadow; and when they went into the cloud the disciples were afraid. And a voice came from the cloud saying, 'This is my Son, the Chosen One. Listen to him.' And after the voice had spoken, Jesus was found alone. The disciples kept silence and, at that time, told no one what they had seen.
