### Important Announcement for EVERYONE attending churches for Mass.

It is **MANDATORY** for every person 16 years of age or older who enters the Sacred Heart Church, the Cathedral and Cathedral Centre for any reason is required to provide their information for contact tracing using the Free Check in TAS app or by the written visitor's register. This is a direction from Tasmania Government. Non compliance may result in a fine.



### The significance of "All Souls Day"

November 2nd, is All Souls day in the Church's liturgical calendar. On the day following the feast of All Saints, we remember those who have not yet achieved the goal of their pilgrimage, the Kingdom of Heaven.

The feast of All Souls developed along side the feast of All Saints. The Church has always encouraged prayers for the faithful departed. In the early years, a list of the names of the dead was placed in the church so that the community would remember them in prayer. During World War I, Pope Benedict XV, in acknowledgment of the vast numbers killed in the war, granted all priests the privilege of offering three Masses on All Souls, a privilege which still applies today.

On All Souls Day, we not only remember the dead, but we apply our efforts, through prayer, almsgiving, and the Mass, to their release from Purgatory. There are two plenary indulgences attached to All Souls Day, one for visiting a church and another for visiting a cemetery. (The plenary indulgence for visiting a cemetery can also be obtained every day from November 1-8, and, as a partial indulgence, on any day of the year.) While the actions are performed by the living, the merits of the indulgences are applicable only to the souls in Purgatory. Since a plenary indulgence removes all of the temporal punishment for sin, which is the reason why souls are in Purgatory in the first place, applying a plenary indulgence to one of the Holy Souls in Purgatory means that the Holy Soul is released from Purgatory and enters Heaven. On All Souls we pray in unity for our deceased relatives and friends and for those who have no one to pray for them.





### Second Reading

Hebrews 7:23-28

This one, because he remains for ever, has an eternal priesthood.

There used to be a great number of priests under the former covenant, because death put an end to each one of them; but this one, Christ, because he remains for ever, can never lose his priesthood. It follows, then, that his power to save is utterly certain, since he is living for ever to intercede for all who come to God through him. To suit us, the ideal high priest would have to be holy, innocent and uncontaminated, beyond the influence of sinners, and raised up above the heavens; one who would not need to offer sacrifices every day, as the other high priests do for their own sins and then for those of the people, because he has done this once and for all by offering himself. The Law appoints high priests who are men subject to weakness; but the promise on oath, which came after the Law, appointed the Son who is made perfect for ever.

**Gospel** Mark 12:28-34

This is the first commandment, and the second is similar to it. One of the scribes came up to Jesus and put a question to him, 'Which is the first of all the commandments?' Jesus replied, 'This is the first: Listen, Israel, the Lord our God is the one Lord, and you your soul, with all your mind, and with all your strength. The second is this: You must love your neighbour as yourself. There is no commandment greater than these.' The scribe said to him, 'Well spoken, Master; what you have said is true: that he is one and there is no other. To love him with all your heart, with all your understanding and strength, and to love your neighbour as yourself, this is far more important than any holocaust or sacrifice.' Jesus, seeing how wisely he had spoken, said, 'You are not far from the kingdom of God.' And after that no one dared to question him any more.

### REFLECTION FOR THE WEEK

It is said that at the time of Jesus the rabbis could count up to 613 commandments contained in the Law: 365 were prohibitions (don't do this!) and 248 were prescriptive (do this!). Some of the rabbis considered all these commandments to be equally important, while others continued to debate in order to identify the most important commandment. That is why, the scribe in the gospel story of today had reasons to ask Jesus, "Which is the greatest commandment of the Law?" Jesus picks up two sentences and summarises the Torah in the simplest of terms:

"You must love the Lord your God with all your heart, with all your soul, and with all your mind" (from Deuteronomy 6:5), and "You must love your neighbour as yourself" (Leviticus 19:18).

In the synoptic gospels this summary has three dimensions that are put together as the greatest commandment: love the Lord your God, love yourself and love your neighbour. I would like to look into this with the eyes of prayer, Jesus repeats the words of the Scriptures, "You must love the Lord your God with all your heart, with all your soul, and with all your mind, and with all your strength." This sentence seemed very abstract to me until I came to practice contemplative prayer. I suppose the love of God is tangible when we are praying and acting aware of his presence. But a prayer, in which I am just asking God for this and that favour, does not fully reflect the love of God. However, a type of prayer in which I am just available to God, opening up my heart to him, just listening to him becomes an expression of the love of God. And when this attitude becomes a habit in my daily life, and not necessarily tied to specific moments of prayer, then I begin to "love the Lord with all my heart, with all my soul, with all my mind and with all my strength." Prayer facilitates the journey into the depths of oneself. This journey helps get in touch with my inner desires, and this prepares me to be empathetic towards others' desires. And because I am created in the image of God (Gen 1:27) by getting in touch with the inner self, I get in touch with God and helps me see in my neighbour this image of God as well. Fr Leonard Caldera
