Immaculate Heart of Mary

What does the Immaculate Heart of Mary mean?

The Immaculate Heart of Mary signifies, first of all, the great purity and love of the heart of the Blessed Virgin Mary for God. This purity is manifested in her "Yes" to the Father at the Incarnation, her love for, and cooperation with, the Incarnate Son in His redemptive mission, and her docility to the Holy Spirit, enabling her to remain free of the stain of personal sin throughout her life. Mary's Immaculate Heart, therefore, points us to her profound interior life, where she experienced both joys and sorrows, yet remained faithful, as we, too, are called to do.

Saint Ephrem Prayer

O pure and immaculate and likewise blessed Virgin, who art the sinless Mother of thy Son, the mighty Lord of the universe, thou who art inviolate and altogether holy, the hope of the hopeless and sinful, we sing thy praises. We bless thee, as full of every grace, thou who didst bear the God-Man: we all bow low before thee; we invoke thee and implore thine aid. Rescue us, O holy and inviolate Virgin from every necessity that presses upon us and from all the temptations of the devil. Be our intercessor and advocate at the hour of death and judgment; deliver us from the fire that is not extinguished and from the outer darkness; make us worthy of the glory of thy Son, O dearest and most clement Virgin Mother. Thou indeed art our only hope, most sure and sacred in God's sight, to whom be honour and glory, majesty and dominion, for ever and ever, world without end. Amen.



ST MARY OF THE CROSS FEAST DAY TUESDAY 8TH AUGUST 2023

Helen MacKillop was born in Fitzroy, Melbourne on January 15, 1842. Together with Fr Tenison Woods, Mary founded the Congregation of the Sisters

of St Joseph in 1867, an Order dedicated to the education of poor children. Mary faced many challenges, not least of which was her (questionable) excommunication by Bishop Shiel in September 1871 – an excommunication lifted five months later. By 1891, there were three hundred sisters working in nine dioceses in Australia and New Zealand.

An ordinary Australian woman, yet a woman of heroic holiness, goodness, warmth and determination, Mary died on August 8, 1909. On October 17, 2010 Mary MacKillop, Saint Mary of the Cross, was declared a Saint by Pope Benedict XVI.

One of her best known sayings is 'Never see a need without doing something about it!'

REFLECTION THE TRANSFIGURATION of the LORD YEAR A

THEY SAW ONLY JESUS

The scripture readings for our liturgy today are interconnected. The prophet Daniel writes about his prophetic dream describing his vision regarding the 'end times.' He speaks of a throne, burning fire, thousands of people, clouds, kingship and an empire which will last forever. The Book of Daniel is inspiring as it depicts the struggles Daniel experienced against the need for power, fame, sinfulness and idolatry. His constant trust in God's love and forgiveness was always before him. The following excerpt is from the prayer of Daniel. (CH.9:v5) 'O Lord, God great and to be feared, you keep your covenant and have kindness for those who love you and keep your commandments.' (I invite you to read this prayer which is in your Bible.

St Peter speaks fearlessly about his experience of the Transfiguration and with conviction. He wants his listeners to accept and to trust in the words he has spoken, 'to be a light in the darkness of their lives, until the dawn comes and the morning star rises in your mind.' As you read this account of the Transfiguration have you ever wondered what Jesus, Peter, James and John may have been talking about as they ascended the mountain. Were thay talking about mission or ministry, the giving and sharing of goods, may be they were praying the psalms. During the Transfiguration the glory of the divinity of Jesus enveloped his humanity. His friends were momentarily overcome especially with the appearance of Moses (LAW) and Elijah (Prophesy) and on hearing the voice of God coming from the cloud. When we reflect on this scene it becomes a fusion of the Old and New Testaments when Moses and Elijah appear in their midst.

What were they discussing among themselves?

Jesus was aware of his friend's wants and emotional fears of the moment especially after they had heard the voice of the Father coming from the cloud. "this is my Son, the Beloved, he enjoys my favour. Listen to Him." We are told by St Matthew, 'Jesus then came up to his friends, touched them and said, "Stand up, don't be afraid."

What is Jesus saying to you today? How is he transforming your life?

'We praise you, we bless you, we adore you, we glorify you, we give thanks for your great glory. O God, almighty Father. Amen




The Angelus Prayer

First Reading

Daniel 7:9-10, 13-14

As I watched:

Thrones were set in place and one of great age took his seat. His robe was white as snow, the hair of his head as pure as wool. His throne was a blaze of flames, its wheels were a burning fire. A stream of fire poured out,

issuing from his presence.

A thousand thousand waited on him, ten thousand times ten thousand stood before him.

A court was held and the books were opened.

I gazed into the visions of the night.

And I saw, coming on the clouds of heaven, one like a son of man.

He came to the one of great age and was led into his presence.

On him was conferred sovereignty,

glory and kingship. and men of all peoples, nations and languages became

which shall never pass away, nor will his empire ever be destroyed.

Responsorial Psalm

So we have confirmation of what was said in prophecies; and you will be right to depend on prophecy and take it as a lamp for lighting a way through the dark until the dawn comes and the morning star rises in your minds.

Gospel Matthew 17:1-9

clothes became as white as the light. Suddenly Moses and Elijah appeared to them; they were talking with him. Then Peter spoke to Jesus. 'Lord,' he said 'it is wonderful for us to be here; if you wish, I will make three tents here, one for you, one for Moses and one for Elijah.' He was still speaking when suddenly a bright cloud covered them with shadow, and from the cloud there came a voice which said, 'This is my Son, the Beloved; he enjoys my favour. Listen to him.' When they heard this, the disciples fell on their faces, overcome with fear. But Jesus came up and touched them. 'Stand up,' he said 'do not be afraid.' And when they raised their eyes they saw no one but only Jesus.

As they came down from the mountain Jesus gave them this order, 'Tell no one about the vision until the Son of Man has risen from the dead.'
