10TH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME - 9th June 2024

I remember growing up hearing the saying “two wrongs don’t make a right!”

If only Adam and Eve had heard the same advice, as God in our first reading from Genesis calls out to Adam, he discovers they have eaten of the tree and when he asks them about it, Adam’s answer is “Eve started it” and Eve’s answer is “the serpent started it” they are both trying to justify their wrong actions based on the other person already doing the wrong thing, they did, so I can. Once again, two wrongs don’t make a right.

It is Jesus who through his life and ministry, passion, death and resurrection shows us the true meaning, he has so many people commit wrongs against him, and yet he does not reply in kind, they did the wrong thing, so I can, instead he keeps his focus on doing the will of God, and in all the right things he does, because he does not act in the way that those around him do that we are so blessed to read the words of St Paul today in his letter to the Corinthians “we too believe and therefore we too speak, knowing that he who raised the Lord Jesus to life will raise us with Jesus in our turn”.

As Catholics today, this advice remains quite sound. After all we are called to be in the world but not of the world. And yet the temptation is always there, others do things, and it would be so much easier if I did the same. But we are called to greater things, and yes they can be harder things, we are called to be Jesus’s “brother and sister and mother” to do the will of God. And no greater example is there then Jesus’s own mother. When Jesus says ‘my brother and sister and mother are those who do the will of God’, besides Jesus himself there is no greater example of one who heard the call of God, and lived the will of God in everything she did, even at the hardest of moments, and there could be no harder moment for a mother then to walk the passion and death of her Son.

In response to the scribes accusing Jesus of casting out demons through the devil, he reminds them that no house can remain standing if divided against itself, the same goes for us, as Catholics, we can’t follow the example of Mary and the Saints who have heard and lived the will of God if we are trying to copy the wrongs of the world.

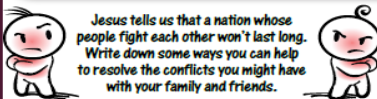

READINGS OF THE DAY – 10TH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

First Reading Genesis 3:9-15

The Lord God called to the man after he had eaten of the tree. 'Where are you?' he asked. 'I heard the sound of you in the garden;' he replied 'I was afraid because I was naked, so I hid.' 'Who told you that you were naked?' he asked. 'Have you been eating of the tree I forbade you to eat?' The man replied, 'It was the woman you put with me; she gave me the fruit, and I ate it.' Then the Lord God asked the woman, 'What is this you have done?' The woman replied, 'The serpent tempted me and I ate.' Then the Lord God said to the serpent, 'Because you have done this, 'Be accursed beyond all cattle, all wild beasts. You shall crawl on your belly and eat dust every day of your life. I will make you enemies of each other: you and the woman, your offspring and her offspring. It will crush your head and you will strike its heel.'

Second Reading 2 Corinthians 4:13-5:1

As we have the same spirit of faith that is mentioned in scripture – I believed, therefore I spoke - we too believe and therefore we too speak, knowing that he who raised the Lord Jesus to life will raise us with Jesus in our turn, and put us by his side and you with us. You see, all this is for your benefit, so that the more grace is multiplied among people, the more thanksgiving there will be, to the glory of God. That is why there is no weakening on our part, and instead, though this outer man of ours may be falling into decay, the inner man is renewed day by day. Yes, the troubles which are soon over, though they weigh little, train us for the carrying of a weight of eternal glory which is out of all proportion to them. And so we have no eyes for things that are visible, but only for things that are invisible; for visible things last only for a time, and the invisible things are eternal. For we know that when the tent that we live in on earth is folded up, there is a house built by God for us, an everlasting home not made by

human hands, in the heavens.

Gospel Acclamation John 12:31. 32

Alleluia, alleluia!

The prince of this world will now be cast out,
and when I am lifted up from the earth
I will draw all to myself, says the Lord.

Gospel Mark 3:20-35

Jesus went home with his disciples, and such a crowd collected that they could not even have a meal. When his relatives heard of this, they set out to take charge of him, convinced he was out of his mind. The scribes who had come down from Jerusalem were saying, 'Beelzebul is in him,' and, 'It is through the prince of devils that he casts devils out.' So he called them to him and spoke to them in parables, 'How can Satan cast out Satan? If a kingdom is divided against itself, that kingdom cannot last. And if a household is divided against itself, that household can never stand. Now if Satan has rebelled against himself and is divided, he cannot stand either - it is the end of him. But no one can make his way into a strong man's house and burgle his property unless he has tied up the strong man first. Only then can he burgle his house. 'I tell you solemnly, all men's sins will be forgiven, and all their blasphemies; but let anyone blaspheme against the Holy Spirit and he will never have forgiveness: he is guilty of an eternal sin.' This was because they were saying, 'An unclean spirit is in him.' His mother and brothers now arrived and, standing outside, sent in a message asking for him. A crowd was sitting round him at the time the message was passed to him, 'Your mother and brothers and sisters are outside asking for you.' He replied, 'Who are my mother and my brothers?' And looking round at those sitting in a circle about him, he said, 'Here are my mother and my brothers. Anyone who does the will of God, that person is my brother and sister and mother.'
