21ST SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME - 25th August 2024 SOCIAL JUSTICE SUNDAY

The readings of the day present a powerful reflection on the themes of decision, fidelity, and the challenges of discipleship. The texts invite the faithful to consider their commitment to God, the implications of following Christ, and the cost of true discipleship.

This reading underscores the importance of decision-making in the spiritual journey. Joshua's call to choose whom they will serve is a timeless challenge that resonates with every believer. It is a moment of reckoning, a call to renew one's commitment to God. The Israelites' response highlights the need for gratitude and remembrance of God's past actions as motivations for fidelity. For contemporary believers, this passage invites reflection on their faith commitments and the need to continually choose God amidst the myriad of distractions and alternatives the world offers.

Paul's teaching on marriage is deeply rooted in the concept of sacrificial love and mutual respect. Paul is advocating for a relationship that mirrors Christ's love for the Church—a love that is self-giving, self-sacrificing, and redemptive. For modern readers, this passage calls for a deeper understanding of the nature of Christian love, which transcends cultural norms and focuses on the selfless giving of oneself for the good of the other. It also serves as a reminder that every Christian relationship, not just marriage, should be grounded in love, respect, and mutual submission to the Lord.

The Gospel passage confronts the stark reality of discipleship: following Jesus is not always easy, and His teachings can be challenging to accept. The reaction of the disciples who walk away reflects the cost of true discipleship, which involves accepting difficult truths and trusting in Jesus even when it defies human understanding. Peter's confession of faith contrasts those who leave, showcasing the courage needed to stay with Jesus despite doubts and uncertainties.

For the faithful, this passage serves as a reminder that faith in Jesus requires a commitment that may go against personal inclinations, societal norms, or logical reasoning. It is a call to trust in the person of Christ, who offers eternal life, even when His words are difficult to understand or accept. The Gospel challenges believers to examine their responses to Jesus' teachings: Will they turn away when faced with difficult truths, or will they, like Peter, acknowledge that Jesus alone has "the words of eternal life"?

The readings collectively emphasize the importance of deliberately choosing to follow God. To follow Christ is demanding and involves embracing difficult teachings and living out sacrificial love. Peter's declaration of faith is, encouraging the faithful to reflect on their commitment to Christ. Despite challenges, there is a deep sense of peace and assurance in choosing to follow Jesus.



SOCIAL JUSTICE SUNDAY—25TH AUGUST 2024

This year's statement focuses on peace and violence in the world, under the title of Truth and Peace: a Gospel Word in a Violent World.

In a tradition stretching back to 1940, the Australian Catholic Bishops release a major social justice statement each year ahead of Social Justice Sunday. This year's statement was released yesterday (Tuesday). Each year, the statement encourages our Catholic community to reflect on and act on social, economic, and ecological issues, reminding us of the social dimension of the Church's mission.

Who is Bl. Carlo Acutis?

Blessed Carlo Acutis died from leukemia in 2006 when he was just 15 years old. Carlo had a deep devotion to the Holy Eucharist and used his passion for technology to create a website that documented approved Eucharistic miracles. He once described the Eucharist as "the highway to heaven". Carlo was beatified in 2020 and is currently in the process of becoming a canonised saint. He is a role model for young people around the world, drawing many deeper into their Catholic faith.



READINGS OF THE DAY – 21ST SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

First Reading Joshua 24:1-2,15-18

Joshua gathered all the tribes of Israel together at Shechem; then he called the elders, leaders, judges and scribes of Israel, and they presented themselves before God. Then Joshua said to all the people: 'If you will not serve the Lord, choose today whom you wish to serve, whether the gods that your ancestors served beyond the River, or the gods of the Amorites in whose land you are now living. As for me and my House, we will serve the Lord.' The people answered, 'We have no intention of deserting the Lord and serving other gods! Was it not the Lord our God who brought us and our ancestors out of the land of Egypt, the house of slavery, who worked those great wonders before our eyes and preserved us all along the way we travelled and among all the peoples through whom we journeyed. We too will serve the Lord, for he is our God.'

Responsorial Psalm Ps 33:2-3. 16-23. R. v.9

(R.) Taste and see the goodness of the Lord.

- I will bless the Lord at all times, his praise always on my lips; in the Lord my soul shall make its boast. The humble shall hear and be glad. (R.)
- 2. The Lord turns his face against the wicked to destroy their remembrance from the earth. The Lord turns his eyes to the just and his ears to their appeal. (R.)
- They call and the Lord hears and rescues them in all their distress.

Second Reading Ephesians 5:21-32

Give way to one another in obedience to Christ. Wives should regard their husbands as they regard the Lord, since as Christ is head of the Church and saves the whole body, so is a husband the head of his wife; and as the Church submits to Christ, so should wives to their husbands, in everything. Husbands should love their wives just as Christ loved the Church and sacrificed himself for her to make her holy. He made her clean by washing her in water with a form of words, so that

when he took her to himself she would be glorious, with no speck or wrinkle or anything like that, but holy and faultless. In the same way, husbands must love their wives as they love their own bodies; for a man to love his wife is for him to love himself. A man never hates his own body, but he feeds it and looks after it; and that is the way Christ treats the Church, because it is his body – and we are its living parts. For this reason, a man must leave his father and mother and be joined to his wife, and the two will become one body. This mystery has many implications; but I am saying it applies to Christ and the Church.

Gospel John 6:60-69

After hearing his doctrine many of the followers of Jesus said, 'This is intolerable language. How could anyone accept it?' Jesus was aware that his followers were complaining about it and said, 'Does this upset you? What if you should see the Son of Man ascend to where he was before? 'It is the spirit that gives life, the flesh has nothing to offer. The words I have spoken to you are spirit and they are life. 'But there are some of you who do not believe.' For Jesus knew from the outset those who did not believe, and who it was that would betray him. He went on, 'This is why I told you that no one could come to me unless the Father allows him.' After this, many of his disciples left him and stopped going with him. Then Jesus said to the Twelve, 'What about you, do you want to go away too?' Simon Peter answered, 'Lord, who shall we go to? You have the message of eternal life, and we believe; we know that you are the Holy One of God.'
