13TH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME - 30th June 2024

There is a quote from St Augustine on faith that goes "Faith is to believe what you do not see. The reward of faith is to see what you believe."

The woman in the gospel had faith to believe what she couldn't see, she couldn't know for certain that touching Jesus would heal her, but she believed, and through that faith she was rewarded. The woman in todays Gospel is worth reflecting on, especially as we prepare to celebrate Mass, and we are invited to receive Christ in Word and in Sacrament.

Imagine what it must have been like for the woman even before this moment she had spent all she had, tried many, and we are told, some painful treatments, and nothing had worked. And now she comes to Jesus and finds a large crowd hindering her from getting close to him, the pain she must have been going through, not just physically but emotionally making it difficult to get close and of course the great risk she undertook as according to the law she would have been considered unclean, culture would have told her to stay away from Jesus.

And yet she risks it all, propelled by faith, her condition only getting worse, she reaches out and grabs his cloak, and is healed. I can't even imagine what that moment must have felt like, and then Jesus turns around, demanding to know who touched him, I wonder if she feared that he might take it back, and yet she also had courage to come toward him and fall at his feet, and what it must have meant to hear his words "My daughter, your faith has restored you to health; go in peace and be free from your complaint."

Do we have that great faith that the woman showed when she touched Jesus' clothes, just as the crowd made it difficult for her to come to Jesus, the noise of the world around us, telling us that we don't need Christ becomes our own crowd hindering us from getting close to him. Just as the woman suffered, so do we in many different ways, and we try to find so many ways offered by the world to fix, or hide the pain, instead of placing our faith in Christ, and just as the woman was deemed unclean do we avoid coming to Christ because we believe ourselves unclean and unworthy, knowing that we are just getting worse.

And yet just as the woman touched his clothing, we come before our Lord with courage even though like the woman we might be frightened. When we go up to receive Christ in the blessed Sacrament, as we hear the words "The Body of Christ" and we reply "Amen" (Yes it is), we fall at his feet, we hold Christ as the woman held his cloak.

And if we listen we might hear him say "My child, your faith has restored you, go in peace."





READINGS OF THE DAY – 13TH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

First Reading Wisdom 1:13-15; 2:23-24.

Death was not God's doing, he takes no pleasure in the extinction of the living. To be – for this he created all; the world's created things have health in them, in them no fatal poison can be found, and Hades holds no power on earth; for virtue is undying. Yet God did make man imperishable, he made him in the image of his own nature; it was the devil's envy that brought death into the world, as those who are his partners will discover.

Second Reading 2 Corinthians 8:7. 9. 13-15.

You always have the most of everything – of faith, of eloquence, of understanding, of keenness for any cause, and the biggest share of our affection – so we expect you to put the most into this work of mercy too. Remember how generous the Lord Jesus was: he was rich, but he became poor for your sake, to make you rich out of his poverty. This does not mean that to give relief to others you ought to make things difficult for yourselves: it is a question of balancing what happens to be your surplus now against their present need, and one day they may have something to spare that will supply your own need. That is how we strike a balance: as scripture says: The man who gathered much had none too much, the man who gathered little did not go short.

Gospel Mark 5:21-43

When Jesus had crossed in the boat to the other side, a large crowd gathered round him and he stayed by the lakeside. Then one of the synagogue officials came up, Jairus by name, and seeing

him, fell at his feet and pleaded with him earnestly, saying, 'My little daughter is desperately sick. Do come and lay your hands on her to make her better and save her life.' Jesus went with him and a large crowd followed him; they were pressing all round him. Now there was a woman who had suffered from a haemorrhage for twelve years; after long and painful treatment under various doctors, she had spent all she had without being any the better for it, in fact, she was getting worse. She had heard about Jesus, and she came up behind him through the crowd and touched his cloak. 'If I can touch even his clothes,' she had told herself 'I will be well again.' And the source of the bleeding dried up instantly, and she felt in herself that she was cured of her complaint. Immediately aware that power had gone out from him, Jesus turned round in the crowd and said, 'Who touched my clothes?' His disciples said to him, 'You see how the crowd is pressing round you and yet you say, "Who touched me?"' But he continued to look all round to see who had done it. Then the woman came forward, frightened and trembling because she knew what had happened to her, and she fell at his feet and told him the whole truth. 'My daughter,' he said 'your faith has restored you to health; go in peace and be free from your complaint.' While he was still speaking some people arrived from the house of the synagogue official to say, 'Your daughter is dead: why put the Master to any further trouble?' But Jesus had overheard this remark of theirs and he said to the official, 'Do not be afraid; only have faith.' And he allowed no one to go with him except Peter and James and John the brother of James. So they came to the official's house and Jesus noticed all the commotion, with people weeping and wailing unrestrainedly. He went in and said to them, 'Why all this commotion and crying? The child is not dead, but asleep.' But they laughed at him. So he turned them all out and, taking with him the child's father and mother and his own companions, he went into the place where the child lay. And taking the child by the hand he said to her, 'Talitha, kum!' which means, 'little girl, I tell you to get up.' The little girl got up at once and began to walk about, for she was twelve years old. At this they were overcome with astonishment, and he ordered them strictly not to let anyone know about it, and told them to give her something to eat.
