Jesus didn't mean his disciples to be destitute but to freely give up everything for the sake of the Kingdom of God, a Kingdom of compassion and love. To be truly happy - that is blessed; is God's gift to those who follow his command of love of God and of neighbour. The third beatitude of discipleship is the foundation of all that is to become like Jesus in word and selfless action. When at prayer we can experience our true poverty as we endeavour to become Christlike in our relationships, to be fed by his word and comforted by his presence.

Biblical history reports that the prophet Jeremiah was a man of peace chosen by God to prophesy 'strife and destruction.' Jeremiah felt unworthy of this command; he felt he was lacking knowledge and experience. God reassured Jeremiah, "Do not be afraid", he said, "I am with you to protect you." In today's reading we are given but a glimmer of Jeremiah's wisdom. God's warning; if humanity participates only in all that pleases human flesh disregarding the law of God then humanity becomes like a dried up wilderness worthless and uninhabitable; strong words as prophesied by Jeremiah. He himself was persecuted many times. He was put into the stock jeered at and whipped many times at the hands of those who opposed his wisdom. His perseverance at such times enduring inhumane treatment earned him his eternal place among the Old Testament saints.

God's gift to us. Blest are those who trust in the Lord at all times. The second stanza of the first reading points to blessings - grace given by God to all who put their trust in him in all events of life. Our baptismal graces of faith, hope and love; at times not easy to understand nd live; are built upon our absolute trust in the wisdom of God. These gifts are our foundation stones as we strive to follow the example of Jesus thrusting our roots into given graces by which we can yield a rich harvest. Glory and praise to our God now and forever. Amen



READINGS OF THE DAY – 6TH SUNDAY OF ORDINARY TIME YEAR C

First Reading Jeremiah 17:5-8

The Lord says this:

'A curse on the man who puts his trust in man, who relies on things of flesh, whose heart turns from the Lord. He is like dry scrub in the wastelands: if good comes, he has no eyes for it, he settles in the parched places of the wilderness, a salt land, uninhabited. 'A blessing on the man who puts his trust in the Lord, with the Lord for his hope. He is like a tree by the waterside that thrusts its roots to the stream: when the heat comes it feels no alarm, its foliage stays green; it has no worries in a year of drought, and never ceases to bear fruit.'

Responsorial Psalm <u>Psalm 1:1-4. R. Ps 39:5</u>

(R.) Happy are they who hope in the Lord.

- Happy indeed is the man who follows not the counsel of the wicked; nor lingers in the way of sinners nor sits in the company of scorners, but whose delight is the law of the Lord and who ponders his law day and night. (R.)
- He is like a tree that is planted beside the flowing waters, that yields its fruit in due season and whose leaves shall never fade; and all that he does shall prosper. (R.)
- Not so are the wicked, not so!
 For they like winnowed chaff shall be driven away by the wind.
 For the Lord guards the way of the just but the way of the wicked leads to doom. (R.)

Second Reading <u>1 Corinthians 15:12, 16-20</u>

If Christ raised from the dead is what has been preached, how can some of you be saying that there is no resurrection of the dead? For if the dead are not raised, Christ has not been raised, and if Christ has not been raised, you are still in your sins. And what is more serious, all who have died in Christ have perished. If our hope in Christ has been for this life only, we are the most unfortunate of all people. But Christ has in fact been raised from the dead, the firstfruits of all who have fallen asleep.

Alleluia, alleluia!

Rejoice and be glad; your reward is great in heaven. *Alleluia*!

Gospel <u>Luke 6:17. 20-26</u>

Jesus came down with the Twelve and stopped at a piece of level ground where there was a large gathering of his disciples with a great crowd of people from all parts of Judaea and from Jerusalem and from the coastal region of Tyre and Sidon who had come to hear him and to be cured of their diseases.

Then fixing his eyes on his disciples he said:

'How happy are you who are poor: yours is the kingdom of God.

Happy you who are hungry now: you shall be satisfied. Happy you who weep now: you shall laugh.

'Happy are you when people hate you, drive you out, abuse you, denounce your name as criminal, on account of the Son of Man. Rejoice when that day comes and dance for joy, for then your reward will be great in heaven. This was the way their ancestors treated the prophets.

'But alas for you who are rich: you are having your consolation now.

Alas for you who have your fill now: you shall go hungry.

Alas for you who laugh now: you shall mourn and weep.

'Alas for you when the world speaks well of you! This was the way their ancestors treated the false prophets.'
