Mercy and Love without Limits

Today's scripture challenges us to embrace radical love and mercy, modelled after God's boundless compassion. It calls us beyond human instincts of revenge and self-preservation, inviting us instead to live as children of God—marked by forgiveness, generosity, and love for all, even our enemies.

The reading from the book of Samuel presents one of the most striking examples of mercy in the Old Testament. King Saul, driven by jealousy, relentlessly pursues David to kill him. Yet, when David finds Saul vulnerable, asleep with his spear at his side, he refuses to take advantage of the situation. Instead of seeking revenge, David chooses to respect Saul as "the Lord's anointed."

David's decision is a profound lesson in trusting God's justice rather than taking matters into our own hands. It reflects the Christian call to love our enemies, even when we have the power to harm them. David recognizes that true strength lies not in violence but in self-restraint and reverence for God's plan.

In the second reading from St. Paul's letter to Corinthians, he contrasts Adam, the man of dust, with Christ, the man of heaven. Adam represents our fallen nature, prone to selfishness and sin, while Christ embodies the new humanity, transformed by grace. Paul reminds us that, as followers of Christ, we are called to bear His image—to live not according to worldly standards but in the holiness and love of God.

This reading challenges us to rise above the instincts of revenge and hatred. Instead of merely responding to situations as the world does, we are called to reflect the heavenly image of Christ, who loved and forgave even from the cross. The Gospel from Luke's Sermon on the Plain is one of the most radical teachings of Jesus: "Love your enemies, do good to those who hate you, bless those who curse you." Jesus calls His disciples to a life of selfless love, generosity, and forgiveness that surpasses human expectations.

This passage is a direct challenge to the logic of the world. It is easy to love those who love us, but true discipleship is measured by our ability to love those who wrong us. Jesus invites us to be merciful as the Father is merciful—offering kindness, not because others deserve it, but because we are children of a merciful

The message is one of mercy and love without limits. Like David, we are called to trust in God's justice rather than seek revenge. Like Paul, we must embrace our heavenly identity. And most importantly, we must take to heart Jesus' command to love our enemies, bless those who hurt us, and give without expecting a

This is not an easy calling, but it is the way of Christ. In a world that often encourages division and retaliation, Christians are called to stand out as beacons of mercy and love. The question we must ask ourselves is: Are we truly reflecting the image of Christ in the way we treat others, especially those who wrong us?

READINGS OF THE DAY – 7TH SUNDAY OF ORDINARY TIME YEAR C

1 Samuel 26:2. 7-9. 12-13. 22-23 First Reading

Saul set off and went down to the wilderness of Ziph, accompanied by three thousand men chosen from Israel to search for David in the wilderness of Ziph.

So in the dark David and Abishai made their way towards the force, where they found Saul asleep inside the camp, his spear stuck in the ground beside his head, with Abner and the troops lying round him.

Then Abishai said to David, 'Today God has put your enemy in your power; so now let me pin him to the ground with his own spear. Just one stroke! I will not need to strike him twice. David answered Abishai, Do not kill him, for who can lift his hand against the Lord's anointed and be without guilt?' David took the spear and the pitcher of water from beside Saul's head, and they made off. No one saw, no one knew, no one woke up; they were all asleep, for a deep sleep refuse your tunic. Give to everyone who asks you, and do not from the Lord had fallen on them.

David crossed to the other side and halted on the top of the mountain a long way off; there was a wide space between them. David then called out, 'Here is the king's spear. Let one love those who love them. And if you do good to those who of the soldiers come across and take it. The Lord repays everyone for his uprightness and loyalty. Today the Lord put you in my power, but I would not raise my hand against the Lord's anointed.'

Second Reading <u>1 Corinthians 15:45-49</u>

The first man, Adam, as scripture says, became a living soul; but the last Adam has become a life-giving spirit. That is, first the one with the soul, not the spirit, and after that, the one with the spirit. The first man, being from the earth, is earthly by nature; the second man is from heaven. As this earthly man was, so are we on earth; and as the heavenly man is, so

are we in heaven. And we, who have been modelled on the earthly man, will be modelled on the heavenly man.

Gospel Luke 6:27-38

Jesus said to his disciples: 'I say this to you who are listening: Love your enemies, do good to those who hate you, bless those who curse you, pray for those who treat you badly. To the man who slaps you on one cheek, present the other cheek too; to the man who takes your cloak from you, do not ask for your property back from the man who robs you. Treat others as you would like them to treat you. If you love those who love you, what thanks can you expect? Even sinners do good to you, what thanks can you expect? For even sinners do that much. And if you lend to those from whom you hope to receive, what thanks can you expect? Even sinners lend to sinners to get back the same amount. Instead, love your enemies and do good, and lend without any hope of return. You will have a great reward, and you will be sons of the Most High, for he himself is kind to the ungrateful and the wicked.

'Be compassionate as your Father is compassionate. Do not judge, and you will not be judged yourselves; do not condemn, and you will not be condemned yourselves; grant pardon, and you will be pardoned. Give, and there will be gifts for you: a full measure, pressed down, shaken together, and running over, will be poured into your lap; because the amount you measure out is the amount you will be given back.'
