Theme: In Him was life, and that life was the light of men. The Light shines in the darkness and the darkness has not overcome it. (John 1:5-6)

"We can easily forgive a child who is afraid of the dark; the real tragedy of life is when men and women are afraid of the light" Plato. Today's discourse by Jesus in the Gospel is to Nicodemus. Nicodemus appears three times only in the Gospel of John. He first visits Jesus during the nights to discuss his teachings. (John 3:1-21) The second time Nicodemus becomes a mouthpiece of Christ where he reminds his colleagues in the Sanhedrin that the law requires that a person be heard before being judged (John 7:50-51). Finally, Nicodemus appears after the Crucifixion to provide 100 pounds of myrrh and aloes for the Jewish customary embalming the body of Jesus for burial (John 19:39-42). In his book Jesus of Nazareth: Holy Week, Pope Benedict XVI observes that, "The quantity of the balm is extraordinary and exceeds all normal proportions. This is a royal burial." Christian tradition believes that Nicodemus was martyred because of his belief in Christ sometime in the 1st century AD.

It is to this man Nicodemus that Christ tells today: "that the light came into the world, but people preferred darkness to light." This statement of Jesus teaches us three important Gospel realities: Firstly, it reminds us that we are not light neither darkness. Secondly, Christ is the light for he says "I am the light of the world." What does this brings to our mind: The creation story where God says on the first day itself "Let there

be light." Remember God created Sun and Moon on the fourth day but on the first day he created light. Light is the symbol of life, goodness and virtue. This light is universally considered desirable. So Christ stands as the light in the new creation and our desire

for light is fulfilled in Christ. Thirdly and finally it is up to us to choose light or darkness. It is out there. If we are to decide whether we creep into that cave of darkness where we can't see ourselves as we really are or whether we walk into that open space where his light shines on us and we see ourselves as we are; we see the truth of ourselves. Seeing ourselves as we are is the most grace-filled moment in Lent. Because then we give the truth of our hearts to God. When we give the truth of our hearts, Christ creates each one of us as a new creation

and we are born again.

The Greek word "ecclesia" used to refer to Church comes from the two Greek words "ek", meaning "out" and "kaleo", meaning "to call." So we are all as his possession "called out" called out of slavery to freedom, sin to salvation, despair to hope, an existence centred on death to an existence focused on life, darkness to light. May we all run to that light, that grace dur-







In Tímes Past ...

One of the most amusing parts of the old Catholic Standard papers are editorial responses to correspondents. Letters from the public were an important source of information for the paper. They were often printed to convey news about rural parishes. Others were published because they contained reports from overseas, including Australia, New Zealand, and further afield. Some quoted other publications that someone thought might interest readers of the Standard. There were also some that more closely resemble modern 'letters to the editor', opinion pieces that were responding to an issue of the day. But some, rather tantalisingly, were unprintable.

Responding to these unprintable letters, the editor often wrote a short reply in a section 'To Correspondents'. Some of these were simply instructive, like the following from February 1871: 'Mr. N. –

"Sulphur Creek." — Never send coin in a letter, for such letters are always registered by the Postmaster-General, and the person to whom it is addressed is compelled to pay the fees. For small amounts, postage-stamps are better, or post-office orders.' Whoever Mr. N. was, he wasn't alone. Other letters with money attracted similar complaints.

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The authors were generally de-identified either by omission or the use of a non-deplume, but occasionally they were singled

out and named. John Downs of Deddington, for example, was told in September 1870 that 'Every precaution is taken to prevent papers going astray; but if the correct address is not known to the publisher, can he be blamed?' It was a bit of a public slap down, so there may have been more to this story.

Much of the editorial letter-dodging was about the content or quality of the writing submitted for publication. A would-be poet in November 1870 was told bluntly: 'The sentiment good, but the versification incorrect.' And in January 1871 'A Poor Bushman' received the following interesting reply: 'Thanks for your letter, but it would serve no good end to publish it. As regards the person referred to we think it better "to leave him alone with the utmost severity."' Whatever the Bushman described, it sounded juicy.



But short and dismissive quips were not the only means of editorial reply. In February 1872 one J. H. F. of Westbury was excoriated for a writing style that clearly got under the editor's skin: 'We have received your report of the concert at Westbury, but as the communication was not authenticated even by your name, we could not think of inserting it. Add to this, the fact that there were

no less than sixteen mistakes in spelling on one page of foolscap, and some very indifferent grammar, and we shall be excused for not giving insertion to the paper.'


